As part of the Deykin family, we all take pride in wearing our school uniform, which helps create a sense of unity and belonging for everyone.


The Deykin Avenue Junior & Infant School School Uniform is:

White cotton shirt or polo shirt Navy jumper, cardigan or sweatshirt Black shoes (no trainers)

Grey trousers or skirt (or blue and white check pinafore dress in the summer)

Children should only wear stud earrings to school and these should not be worn on PE or swimming days (No hoop earrings).

Please make sure your child has the correct uniform.



<u>PE Kit</u>

Corridor Expectations

We line up in single file.



We walk in the corridors. We are quiet and respectful as we walk around school. We are quiet and patient when we collect our things from our pegs/trolley. We hold doors open for each other and we use our manners.

Assembly Expectations



We line up in single file.

We walk into the hall silently and we are directed by our teacher.

We sit cross-legged, facing forward.

We listen carefully to the person

leading the assembly.

We share our thoughts and ideas when asked by putting our hand up. We are respectful of others' views.

We walk out of the hall silently.





Lunchtime Expectations



We line up in single file.

We ask for our food politely and say thank you. We walk quietly and carefully with our trays to a table.

We eat our dinner using the correct

cutlery.

We use quiet indoor voices to talk to our friends. We put up our hand if we need help from an adult and we use our

manners.

We take our tray and clear it away when we have finished our food.





Library Expectations



We are quiet when using the library. We handle books with care. We place books back on the shelves where we found them. We ask our teacher politely to scan our library card and book before borrowing a book. We return books we have borrowed. We keep our library tidy. We let the books take us to a faraway place.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about



JusTalk Kids is a child's version of the JusTalk app – a highly popular social networking platform designed for users up to 13 years of age, allowing them to video call, message and participate in group chats. While adults can link their own JusTalk account to their child's and make use of parental controls, it's important to understand the risks associated with the app.

SUBSCRIPTION FOR PREMIUM ACCESS

While JusTalk Kids is free, there's the option to subscribe to a kids' premium account or a premium family account. At a cost, this feature allows children to have access to more fun features such as games they can play with others in a call; exclusive stickers; a badge denoting them as a premium subscriber; and exclusive ringtones and themes clusive ringtones and themes.

RESISTANCE TO CONTROLS

0 JusTalk Kids endeavours to allow children the sense of having a chat-based app while allowing parents to set controls (within the app or from their own adult JusTalk account). The basis behind this is positive; however, some children are challenging their parents by refusing to use JusTalk Kids, preferring to use the adult version without any restrictions in place

KNOWING THE PARENT *** PASSCODE

After downloading JusTalk Kids, parents can set a passcode which users must enter to add a pass contacts. The parental controls help to manage which content can be viewed and who children can add as a contact: this then allows children to chat with friends in a controlled environment However, prospective contacts don't have to know a specific username. In theory, someon could type in a random name and then add them as a friend.

POTENTIAL DATA LEAKS

JusTalk and JusTalk Kids claim to be secure and encrypted, going so far as to state that even the developers themselves won't access your data. However, a security lapse in 2022 highlighted that messages were not in fact encrypted – leading to concerns around the security of the app and the transparency of the development team.

CYBERBULLYING

Online chats can provide a sense of anonymity, leading some users to post things which they wouldn't normally say in person. Combined with the option of group chats, there's a risk that young people might join in with this kind of behaviour, escalating it further and potentially turning what should be a fun experience into something deeply negative.

TOO MUCH SCREENTIME



A report by the UK Parliament Education Committee highlighted a 52% increase in children's screen time between 2020 and 2022 – as well as finding that 25% of children used their smartphones in a manner consistent with screen addiction. Introducing children to social networking apps when they're too young can lead to bad digital habits and a reliance on technology from an early age.

Advice for Parents & Educators

JUSTIFY THE CONTROLS

If parents allow their child to use JusTalk Kids, they should explain that they're putting parental controls in place to make the app safer. Make sure the child knows not to put their full name on the account and doesn't use a photo of themselves as their profile picture. This type of open discussion will help to ensure that a child is aware of the app's potential risks and knows how to reduce them.

TALK ABOUT ONLINE FRIENDSHIPS



Young children could be excited to use this app. However, highlight that they must do so in a positive, respectful and responsible manner. While it can be easy to get caught up in a group chat, it's important to talk to others politely and call out any unpleasant behaviour. Discuss the importance of limiting their contacts to people they know in real life and use parental controls to enforce this.



themselves, it can be saved and distributed by others.

Apps like JusTalk can sometimes lend themselves to bullying behaviours. Parents should monitor what their child is sending and receiving, check in with them regularly and encourage them to share their feelings (both positive and negative) at home. Remind them that they can block a contact if someone is treating them disrespectfully.
